In a time when many of our for-profit competitors are sacrificing service quality to benefit their bottom lines, Hope has continued to find ways to achieve exceptional care that prioritizes patient needs. And yet, the industry trends indicate that we need to make some operational changes to maintain our services at the level our community has come to rely on.

In November 2023, I announced some exciting news for Hope Hospice. We are merging with By the Bay Health and Mission Hospice and Home Care, two like-minded

nonprofit hospice organizations headquartered in Marin County and San Mateo County, respectively. Coming together will provide resources needed to navigate the increasingly complex hospice industry and to preserve the sustainability of nonprofit hospice care in Northern California. As a larger combined organization, we are better equipped to meet challenges and to enjoy the efficiency and scaled costs needed to offer more services to more people. The 2022 Hope 100 Golf Marathon drew a strong showing of returning players to Castlewood Country Club in Pleasanton on September 19, along with a few newbies who joined the roster. Together, the group of 31 registrants raised \$138,336.

We kicked off 2023 with the first annual Hope Hospice Crab Feed on February 25. We sold out all 300 seats at the Shannon Center in Dublin and raised \$42,426 through ticket sales, a silent auction, and a live auction of decadent desserts.

Unprecedented winter and spring storms put our May 6 Hike for Hope in jeopardy. Storm damage kept Del Valle Regional Park closed to the public for several preceding months, and it was looking like we'd have to relocate or reschedule. Fortunately, park management gave us a last-minute green light. Nearly 900 hikers showed up despite drizzly weather, helping us raise \$163,722.

Family Caregiver Support

Many family caregivers find themselves in the role unexpectedly, and they feel overwhelmed, unprepared, and unsure of what to do. Hope Hospice is a community resource for such individuals, offering free resources to educate them on best practices in caregiving and to feel supported.

Our monthly Family Caregiver Education Series provides a wealth of resources to help such individuals navigate a sensitive time and to feel empowered to care for their loved ones. Topics include caregiving options, next steps following a dementia diagnosis, and a Medicare overview. We offer the series as live, interactive webinars; recordings are posted to our website.

Nearly half of our patients are living with some degree of dementia. Our Living With Dementia program helps family members cope with the unique challenges that come with caring for a loved one living with dementia. Classes teach about how brain changes affect their loved ones' abilities and behaviors, and support groups offer connection to others with a shared experience.

Outreach Hope's Outreach Team provides critical communication support between our organization and medical/residential facilities in our service

area. Care homes, nursing facilities, nursing schools, and the like benefit from our team's vast knowledge of hospice and specialty topics of interest to those who care for the elderly. In this reporting period, the team provided $412\,\mathrm{hours}$ of education on topics including:

The team also assists with new admissions by meeting with families to answer guestions about the hospice process, and they host exhibit booths at senior fairs to connect with the public.

At the Vine Cinema in Livermore, 116 people attended our screening of Everybody's Oma, a touching documentary about one family's dementia journey with their beloved grandmother. Palliative Care

A grant from the Senior Foundation Eastbay funded our mid-year launch of a Palliative Care program to help meet the needs of people living with serious illnesses who don't yet qualify for the hospice benefit under Medicare or private insurance. Palliative services are similar to those of hospice, but with a few important distinctions in terms of eligibility criteria, services provided, and cost. Learn more at HopeHospice.com/palliative.

Volunteer Program

When Hope launched services in April 1980, we operated with an all-volunteer medical team as well as 15 community members to provide patients with companionship and bedside vigil. We've come a long way as an organization since then, but volunteers remain at the heart of what we do. Donations provide funding for training materials and tools to keep the team organized. Bereavement

Our Grief Support program is one of the services that has been in place since our founding in 1980, and it's something the community has turned to in time of need regardless of whether participants had a loved one on our hospice service.

The team provides one-on-one support, four quarterly support groups organized by type of loss, and check-in calls and letters. The year wraps up with a Service of Remembrance, an online program with personal reflections and music that accompanies a candlelight ceremony and memorial slideshow featuring photos of loved ones who passed in the preceding 18 months.
